## **Allow me to introduce myself-**

My name is Dean and I'm definitely an alcoholic. Five years ago, I finally surrendered after I truly got sick and tired of being sick and tired. Prior to July 7, 2007 I was only sick of hearing people nag at me, telling me I had a problem but on that Friday night five years ago I got sick of myself. I had finally caught up with everyone else who knew me (and were still sticking around, that is). I went to rehab, took suggestions including 90 in 90, got a service position, and reclaimed my life. In the past 5 years I continued my education and am now a substance abuse counselor, certified recovery coach, and productive member of society. Since the first meeting I attended in Cohoes on a Wednesday night after getting out of rehab, I learned quickly an instrumental part of my recovery would be staying connected with others in the rooms and doing service work. My service work began as a coffee maker on those Wednesday nights in Cohoes, then I started answering the phones at the Central Office as a night owl, and when the opportunity and opening for a quarterly newsletter editor arose last month, I felt the calling. So enough about me as it's a "we program." I just wanted to introduce myself and say thank you to all who have been part of my process since '07. I look forward to being your editor and thanks for reading!

## SPOTLIGHT STORY:

**Each issue of the CDCO newsletter will feature a spotlight story of a recovering alcoholic who does it one day at a time.**

### **Ed B.**

*There are many different pathways to recovery. It's not always easy but it's ALWAYS worth it. Recovery is about quality of life. When drinking, are we truly living at all? Ed B. a recovering alcoholic with 38 years of sustained sobriety, shares his experience, strength, and hope and how his life has changed in recovery over the past 3 decades.*

The first time I drank I was 13 years old. My father had some apple cider which turned into hard cider. It was tough stuff. You couldn't even drink it the way it was; we had to mix something in it. That was the first time, when we were kids, when we were just having a "good time." We witnessed a lot of drinking around us. I had in my mind I was going to make sure I could drink and show everyone the proper way to drink and that I could do it better than anyone else. I grew up with drinking -- the fights, the house getting tore up -- it was always there. I came from a family of 8, and I always tried to outdrink everyone. In the later years of high school, it got to be a part of belonging to a certain crowd, we drank. We drank as much as we could. My family had alcohol delivered by the week. No one knew how much was or wasn't in the basement. We always had it. All I had to do is go in my parent's basement. Some people drank at parties or around other people. When they were out, I didn't have to be with other people, I'd drink alone and I always had to have a beer in my pocket, I needed that security. I'd drink until I got sick and then grab another one and keep drinking. I remember now looking back and people pointing at me and saying, "At least I'm not like him." That still sticks with me almost 40 years later. I'd quit every Lent for 40 days, but then on Easter I'd make up for it. It was planned every year. The drinking showed the worst part when I got my license to drive. When I was 21, I got my license and started hitting things pretty quick. I totaled 5 brand new cars, Impalas, in less than a year. In one of the accidents my 3-year-old son was in the car, I had driven off the road and into trees. That wasn't what got me sober; it was actually when I was driving one evening in 1974. I saw lights in my rear view mirror. I got pulled over and the cop told me I had pulled out of a side street and drove directly at him head on and I didn't flinch. He had followed me for 2 miles until I stopped. I went in front of a judge and that saved my life. He sent me to rehab at St. Peter's. He sent me to rehab for 8 weeks. I actually asked to stay longer. Then I started going to AA. In the past 3 decades a lot has happened. Living life on life's terms is sometimes difficult. My son was injured shortly after I got sober. For 4 days I didn't know if he was going to live or not, but I still didn't drink! I've been in situations where I've had to leave. If I feel uncomfortable I leave. I let people know where I'm at in my recovery. There's so much I've gotten to see in recovery like my grandkids birthdays. You always have a chance. Try it. If you've tried, try again. There is success. I was a mess, and there are people who can help you like they helped me.

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We can only keep what we have by giving it away, and when much is given much is expected ! **Did you know only 10% of AA members participate in service work?** We are ALWAYS looking for new volunteers.
