SPOTLIGHT STORY:

Each issue of the CDCO newsletter will feature a spotlight story of a recovering alcoholic who does it one day at a time. This newsletter features Karen M. one of the first alcoholics I met when I got out of rehab and into the rooms.

My first experience was black label beer that was given to me as sips by a family friend at age 4, 5, or 6. When I got in High School it was more of a party on the weekends at bonfires in the woods, football games, after dances, any kind of sporting events, I was very athletic. It was let's get drunk, as drunk as we can. Looking back now I realize my drinking has always been problematic, I've always drank to get drunk it was never socially. By the age of 12 and on as time went on and I left High School and went to college it was a Wednesday through Sunday thing. I'd recuperate Monday and Tuesday, pretend to go to school. It was keg night Wednesday Night, Thursday Night was Ladies Night, Friday Night the party was really on, Saturday 'ya know, then of course the afterhours. It was a constant party until the morning hours. At 20 years old I got pregnant with my daughter and I stopped drinking. Once she was born I rushed her to get to a walking stage so I could get back into hanging out. When she became two I started drinking and hanging out with the party crew again. She didn't need a bottle, didn't need breastfeeding I could take her to whomever to watch her. That's when things got crazy she wasn't a problem but she got in the way of my drinking. I couldn't do what I wanted to I was a single mother, father nowhere in sight which was from the promiscuity of the drinking and partying. There was never a time that I haven't drunk to get drunk, whether it was alcohol or drugs I had a problem from the beginning. Eventually my disease progressed so bad I went from drinking to snorting cocaine to smoking crack. One thing leads to another and in 1992 I got arrested, my daughter was 11 years old and the cops came in guns drawn, guns pointed at me, pointed at my daughter that was devastating to me. I went to jail and got out after 30 days then I was using everyday to deal with the thought of going to prison, losing my kid, I had to use to deal with the feelings, I needed an escape. I ended up getting 5 years probation and going to an outpatient program. I thought I was telling them everything they wanted to hear. Eventually one day my probation officer came in and said I wasn't complying with treatment, she asked me to take a drug test, I failed. My self-disgust was so deep I had thoughts of suicide but I couldn't do that to my daughter. At that point I didn't know how to stop but I was ready. I let go, I said I can't stay sober I don't know how to stop. I went to rehab and from that day forward I never drank or used again! My life has changed because I don't drink and drug anymore, I have coping skills, I live the solutions in life today, I have spirituality, I get answers if I can stay out of my own way. I realize I can't control life, life happens, I do things that build character instead of assassinate it. I am a better person today.
