OUR GREATEST DANGER: RIGIDITY BY BOB PEARSON

Bob Pearson (1917-2008) was General Manager of the G.S.O. from 1974 to 1984, and served as Senior Advisor to the G.S.O. from 1985 until his retirement. His story is in the Big Book as "AA Taught Him to Handle Sobriety," 3rd edit. (1976) pp. 554-561, 4th edit. (2001) pp. 553-559. During the 1986 General Service Conference, Bob gave a powerful and inspiring closing talk to the conference at the closing brunch on Saturday morning, April 26. It was an especially significant occasion, because he knew that he was going to retire early the next year, and that this would be his last General Service Conference. The following excerpts are taken from that farewell speech, as published in the Conference's final report: *The Thirty-Sixth Annual Meeting of the General Service Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous 1986* (Roosevelt Hotel, New York City, April 20-26, 1986), *Final Report.*

This is my 18th General Service Conference -- the first two as a director of the Grapevine and A.A.W.S., followed by four as a general service trustee. In 1972, I rotated out completely, only to be called back two years later as general manager of G.S.O., the service job I held until late 1984. Since the 1985 International Convention, of course, I have been senior adviser. This is also my last Conference, so this is an emotionally charged experience.

I wish I had time to express my thanks to everyone to whom I am indebted for my sobriety and for the joyous life with which I have been blessed for the past nearly 25 years. But since this is obviously impossible, I will fall back on the Arab saying that Bill quoted in his last message, "I thank you for your lives." For without your lives, I most certainly would have no life at all, much less the incredibly rich life I have enjoyed.

Let me offer my thoughts about A.A.'s future. I have no truck with those bleeding deacons who decry every change and view the state of the Fellowship with pessimism and alarm. On the contrary, from my nearly quarter-century's perspective, I see A.A. as larger, healthier, more dynamic, faster growing, more global, more service-minded, more back-to-basics, and more spiritual -- by far -- than when I came through the doors of my first meeting in Greenwich, Connecticut, just one year after the famous [July 1960] Long Beach Convention. A.A. has flourished beyond the wildest dreams of founding members, though perhaps not of Bill himself, for he was truly visionary.

I echo those who feel that if this Fellowship ever falters or fails, it will not be because of any outside cause. No, it will not be because of treatment centers or professionals in the field, or non-Conference-approved literature, or young people, or the dually-addicted, or even the "druggies" trying to come to our closed meetings. If we stick close to our Traditions, Concepts, and Warranties, and if we keep an open mind and an open heart, we can deal with these and any other problems that we have or ever will have. If we ever falter and fail, it will be simply because of us. It will be because we can't control our own egos or get along well enough with each other. It will be because we have too much fear and rigidity and not enough trust and common sense.

If you were to ask me what is the greatest danger facing A.A. today, I would have to answer: the growing *rigidity* -- the increasing demand for absolute answers to nit-picking questions; pressure for G.S.O. to "enforce" our Traditions; screening alcoholics at closed meetings; prohibiting non-Conference-approved literature, i.e., "banning books"; laying more and more rules on groups and members. And in this trend toward rigidity, we are drifting farther and farther away from our co-founders. Bill, in particular, must be spinning in his grave, for he was perhaps the most permissive person I ever met. One of his favorite sayings was, "Every group has the right to be wrong." He was maddeningly tolerant of his critics, and he had absolute faith that faults in A.A. were self-correcting.

And I believe this, too, so in the final analysis we're not going to fall apart. We won't falter or fail. At the 1970 International Convention in Miami, I was in the audience on that Sunday morning when Bill made his brief last public appearance. He was too ill to take his scheduled part in any other convention event, but now, unannounced, on Sunday morning, he was wheeled up from the back of the stage in a wheelchair, attached with tubes to an oxygen tank. Wearing a ridiculous brightorange, host committee blazer, he heaved his angular body to his feet and grasped the podium -- and all pandemonium broke loose. I thought the thunderous applause and cheering would never stop, tears streaming down every cheek. Finally, in a firm voice, like his old self, Bill spoke a few gracious sentences about the huge crowd, the outpouring of love, and the many overseas members there, ending (as I remember) with these words: "As I look over this crowd, I know that Alcoholics Anonymous will live a thousand years -- if it is God's will."

[The following inspiring story by a former resident of The Next Step first appeared in the newsletter of TNS ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION with this accompanying request from the then residents of the halfway house. Since then, one of the two weekly meetings mentioned has "folded" due to lack of outside support.]"Hello TNS Alumna! As you probably know, there are two autonomous AA meetings held each week at TNS: 1 pm on Wednesdays and 7:30 pm on Fridays (this meeting is inactive. ED. NOTE). These meetings have been steadily losing attendance and are struggling to stay alive. We would really appreciate outside help to see these meetings become active, powerful women's meetings again. As the population of The House is constantly changing, we need assistance from TNS graduates to ensure that these meetings are conducted within AA guidelines (regularly scheduled business meetings, election of officers, rotating chairwomen, etc.0 and to teach the current residents how to run and behave at AA meetings.

Please call Susan at TNS Business Office (518-465-5249) if you're able to help us. She'll coordinate the efforts. We thank you in advance. It is not necessary that a woman have gone through TNS; a strong AA program and commitment to recovery will do just fine!"

Now... Juliet's story:

To my sistas going through The Next Step—My name is Juliet; I'm a product of TNS program, a very strong, happy, joyous, and free sister today. The Next Step helped me get my life back: one that I never knew existed. I spent 37 years of my old life in the streets of NYC, Brooklyn, prostituting in abandoned buildings, shooting galleries, crack houses, roofs, anywhere I could find.

It all started in my early years with a drink, cigarettes, and weed. The world sold me a bad dream. I thought it was a good one. I thought my life was and would be wonderful. I started using at the age of ten. By the time I was 15 years old, I was shooting heroin. My disease escalated very fast after the cigarettes, drink and weed began. I had to learn how to be true to the game. When I started prostituting, I became married to the game, along with the lifestyle of living on the streets. I prostituted

MARCH 1, 2010 STORY OF THE DAY

IT SOUNDED like a death sentence:"The medical profession has nothing for you. The clergy has nothing for you. There's nobody in God's world can help you. You're a chronic alcoholic, period."

Well, we've pointed you to the end... or rather, the BEGIN-NING OF THE STORY! ENOY! Not just in Brooklyn, but all over. This disease of addiction dictated I be wherever the drugs were. I became powerless over all things and everything. I thought my life would be like this forever. Alcohol, crack, the streets and King Heroin stole and stripped me of everything: mind, body, spirit, and soul. I couldn't stop on my own; no one could help me anymore. I was dead and stinking.

I became helpless, hopeless, powerless, hungry and very lonely. I found myself living in pain and misery. I suffered as long as I stayed out there, being raped and living in insanity. I thought all of this was normal, but God delivered me. After several ins and outs, I went to a rehab, and then Sally accepted me into The Next Step Program. My sistas, it was not easy in the beginning, or the middle, but I hung in there. I learned new and different things. Most of all, my thinking, my attitudes, and my behaviors needed to be changed. Basically, everything about me had to change. I couldn't understand it then; that was the hard part; but I sure understand it today. The Next Step gave me the best tools for the beautiful, sweet life that I am living today. Trust me, there is life, a good life, on the other side. Just as I worked 24/7 at my old life, and then 24/7 at The Next Step, I work very hard today to hold on to my sobriety, ONE DAY AT A TIME! It is sooo worth it!! I don't have to be a slave any longer to the disease of addiction. I have the desire to recover, and I want it, unlike the time when I was enslaved to the drugs, the alcohol and the streets.

Many of you are very young with big ideas; trust me, the disease of addiction has some big plans for you out there in this ugly world. I am deformed on my right wrist from shooting dope, I have scars and dead veins; my heart used to fail me from cocaine use; my eyesight is bad; my feet often hurt from running the streets. Sometimes I still feel paranoid. As long as I don't pick up, I get better, stronger, and wiser. When I look back at where I have come from, I realize my life is SO much better. ...My thankfulness and gratitude go out to The Next Step Program for giving me a chance to realize how strong and powerful I can be without the drugs; and to The Next Step for giving me hope.

My sistas, you can make it if you try. You're doing it already!! I encourage you to be strong in your journey at The Next Step. You'll be glad you did.
