IT'S NEVER TOO LATE

His name was Carl, and he came into the rooms of A.A. for the first time a little over a year ago, when he was in his early 80's. Carl took to meetings right away, and brightened the rooms with his presence. It was not only his tall and straight stature, but also his perpetual smile, that made him stand out. Early on, he approached one of our members and lamented that he couldn't find a sponsor because there were no men in the rooms older than he was. He was told not to worry: he could ask someone younger. (Incidentally, he later did find someone around his own age.) As he stayed sober one day at a time, Carl could be heard saying "I can't believe all that I've missed by not getting to A.A. sooner!" A Truck driver by trade, he drank every day for 60 years, and said that his truck and his garage were his havens.

He'd bring to meetings cookies and brownies that he had made. They were delicious! But Carl's favorite hobby was wood crafting, and after a while at different meetings he attended, you'd see the Twelve Steps and the Twelve Traditions framed and hinged together so they could stand up on their own. At one noon meeting he attended, Carl noticed that the Chairman's table was wobbly, so he made a new one. And he made smaller objects like butterfly clips, crosses, and children's "bug boxes," all for people he had met in the rooms.


It was obvious that Carl absolutely loved A.A. and made no bones about it. Every time he had a monthly anniversary, he was cheered on heartily by everyone. After he had close to a year, he would always say that it was the happiest year of his life. On his first anniversary we and his family joined to celebrate with him.

Sadly, shortly after that, Carl got some bad news from his doctor. He had an operation and remained in the hospital until he passed away quietly, early in April. But what a legacy he has left for so many people. There are reminders of Carl everywhere, but it was his cheerfulness, gratitude and enthusiasm for A.A. that will serve as an inspiration to me and so many others, for a long, long time.

TYPES OF CALLS




