You never know!

The first snowfall of the winter had blanketed the roads and drastically decreased our Saturday night meeting's typical attendance, so that when I arrived at 7:30 pm, only our loyal Coffeemaker (Mike) was there. We greeted one another and poured cups of coffee, and sat down, chatting about our lives and situations. We shared some stories about our experiences at other sparsely-attended meetings we'd been to, and I even joked about the irony of the two of us sitting there, 40+ years of sobriety between us, holding our usual Saturday night meeting.

About a quarter of eight, the upstairs door squeaked open and a voice called down, "Hello?". He and I shouted back 'hellos', and a few moments later a woman appeared in the doorway: "Is there an Open AA Meeting here tonight?", she asked. He and I answered "This is it", and welcomed her, briefly introducing ourselves and inviting her to join us.

"I'm here with my son, let me get him from the car", she replied. As she passed back up the stairs, the two of us looked at one another, smiled, and nodded. We both intuitively knew that our Higher Power had brought us there this night for a reason.

A couple of minutes later, 'Mom' and her son joined us. A 20-something male who recently completed treatment in a rehab, he was also coming back to AA again after some previous sobriety. We all introduced ourselves, and it turned out that they had driven over ten miles through the snow to this meeting -- he'd found it while searching on his phone.



Mike read the Preamble, and when I read "How It Works", the words had an even more special meaning to me than usual. Right here, right now, sitting right in front of us, was a newcomer, a still sick and suffering alcoholic. This Twelfth Step call had come to us!

As the Chairperson was briefly qualifying, yet another regular arrived...now there were three of us poised to pass on our experience, strength and hope. We went around the room and everyone shared; the spirit of Step 12 was palpably present in the room. "Mom" revealed that she had also attended Al-Anon, and we suggested she continue. Her willingness to go to any length to aid her son was inspiring. Our young friend reported he already had several days of sobriety under his belt and was getting reconnected with the fellowship (we exchanged telephone numbers). After the meeting, Mike and I expressed our gratitude that we had come to the meeting that night. I think we both left with the special feeling of joy that comes from doing a twelfth-step job.

So, once again my Higher Power has shown me that one truly can never know what may happen at the next AA meeting one attends. Will that night's meeting make a difference in our new friend's journey in sobriety? I don't know the answer to that question, but I do know it's made a difference in mine! I am going to keep coming back.
