#### Meet the Volunteers

My friend Jim F. is a great example of how service helps in Recovery.

"I am Responsible. When anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help, I want the hand of A.A. always to be there. And for that: I am responsible." - Written for the 1965 AA International Convention in Toronto

This is the second time I was asked by my friend Debbie P. to put together a few words on service work.

As most AAers know, our perspective on things evolves as we stay sober and work the program and get to know ourselves and our place in the world a little better, or maybe for the first time.

When I made that first cup of coffee more than six years ago — Dick B. recruited me to work the Clubhouse coffee bar 90 days and 30 minutes after my last drink — I remember feeling pretty good about myself.

While I generally kept pretty quiet about my sobriety this time around, I did text my brother and told him I had just made coffee at the Clubhouse. He wasn't impressed. I tried to convey the significance by telling him the joe was for bunch of drunks. Looking back, I can see why it had the opposite effect. He was, though, happy I wasn't drinking away another day.

Today, I still do service work, and I still feel pretty good about myself for doing it. Isn't that one of the program's gifts? To feel good about ourselves and grateful for our lot in life, or at least what we've made of that lot in life, despite how hard we tried to screw it up.

There is no shame in that. Feeling good about yourself. We shouldn't feel guilty or awkward for doing something good and being proud of it. Especially when it involves helping other people, even if it's just handing them a cup of coffee in a paper cup.

During those first couple of years, service work got me out of my own head, and gave me something to fill the void in my life created when I put the bottle down. Drinking is a way of life for an active alcoholic, just like sobriety is a way of life for us now. Service work, for me, during those difficult first couple of years, was probably self-centered but that's OK, I think, because it helped me stay away from a drink and, looking back, taught me to appreciate the AA community as a whole.

Service work in AA is really no different than signing up as a volunteer firefighter in a town or village or a Eucharistic minister at a church. We are just trying to make our corner of the world a little better, and ensure it survives for the next person or generation. Any organization is bigger than any one member, but *every* member is a caretaker of that organization for a little while, and each of us has the responsibility to do his or her part or it will invariably fail.

"We must remember that AA will continue strong only so long as each of us freely and happily gives it away to another person, only as each of us takes our fair share of responsibility for sponsorship of those who still suffer, for the growth and integrity of our group, for our intergroup activities, and for AA as a whole," wrote Dr. Jack Norris in the souvenir book for the 1965 International Convention in Toronto. "It is in taking responsibility that real freedom and the enduring satisfactions of life are found. AA has given us the power to choose – to drink or not to drink – and in doing so has given us the freedom to be responsible for ourselves. As we become responsible for ourselves, we are free to be responsible for our share in AA, and unless we happily accept this responsibility, we lose AA. Strange, isn't it?"

It's not like there is a lack of opportunity for service work in AA. You can take a coffee commitment, be a group officer, speak at jails or rehabs, work the phones at the district office or just reach out your hand to welcome a newcomer.

There is a reason service work is one of the three legacies of AA along with unity and recovery. Without all three legs firmly on the ground, the stool topples. Regrettably, there will be a new generation of alcoholics. Thanks to those doing service work today, AA will be there to help them tomorrow.



## We answer the phone around the clock, 7 days a week, 365 days a year, so that anyone in need of help can talk with the live voice of a recovering alcoholic.

Being involved in Service Work doesn't have to involve a lot of your time. Once a month, exchanging a few hours of watching TV, for a few hours of helping another alcoholic. **Office Volunteers needed!** The Office Volunteers are AA members who answer the phone live and greet and provide services to visitors to the Office during hours it is open. A minimum of one year of continuous sobriety is suggested for this position.

**Night Owl Volunteers needed!** The Night Owls are AA volunteers who take phone calls at home that are forwarded from the Central Office phone during the hours the Office is closed. A minimum of one year of continuous sobriety is suggested for this position.

Capital District Central Office 12th Step List 12th Step service is vital to an A.A. member's continuing spiritual development. The CDCO maintains 12th Step lists in each district we serve. Please consider signing up to make yourself available to give rides to a meeting for A.A.'s visiting from out of town, or people new to the Fellowship. You will also have the opportunity to talk on the phone or go on a 12th Step call with another A.A. to share your experience, strength and hope with somebody who has called CDCO looking for help. Let us know your home group or district so that we can match you up with callers close by.

Capital District Central Office E-Z Riders List The CDCO routinely gets calls from people visiting from out of town. They may be unfamiliar with the area and are looking for rides to local meetings. We also get calls from people new to A.A. who are in the same boat. A.A. members who want to help carry their group's message of recovery are encouraged to sign up as E-Z Riders. By bringing visitors or new folks to your meeting, you will be helping them, your group, and yourself - it's a Win Win! Please let us know your name, phone number and home group (or other groups you're willing to give a ride to) and we will put it on our list.

If you're an alcoholic wondering what service you can do to be helpful, why not give us a call! We'll be glad to provide call taker training, or put you on our Twelfth Step list or E-Z Rider list. You'll be glad you did!

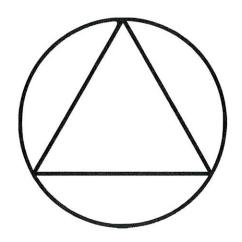
The CDCO sold \$22,491 worth of AA literature, at list price in 2019 and \$4,103 worth of medallions to 972 groups or individuals.

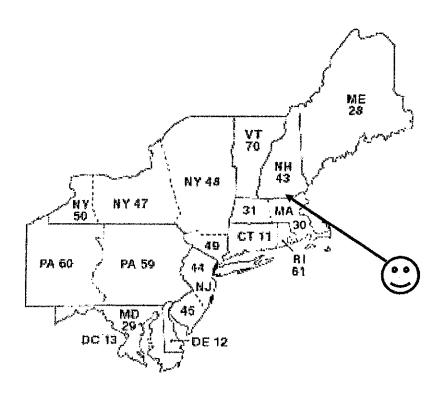
